History of the Universe in twenty minutes is the title of the exhibition of the Mexican artist Juan Pablo Macías taking place the 22th of November 2013 at Kunstraum München. The artist, who has already displayed his project Tiempo Muerto in August 2012 in the context of a summer residence, has now been invited to present the latest issues of the project.

The exhibition focuses on the editorial process of the last two issues of Tiempo Muerto, TM#2 and TM#3. The editorial project was activated in 2012 as a way of accompanying his long-standing project BSR (2009-2010), as pages for reflecting in an abstract and pragmatic sense, the relation between power knowledge and insurrectional knowledge. The main objective of BSR project is the acquisition of a new place for the Bibioteca Social Reconstruir, one of the most important libraries for anarchist literature in Mexico in order to make it accessible to the public again. Major topics of the

In 1980, it opened its doors to the public and became in the following years the major source of information on anarchism in Mexico with its collection of more then 5000 books, amongst them 1000 that are specifically related to anarchism. In July 2009, the library was evicted with a sequestration order. Friends and supporters managed in time to get the collection out of the rented property to save it. Since then the library has been put away in boxes and stored in a small apartment in Mexico City.

journal are the inaccessibility of information held in the hands of private and public institutions, the issue of private property and a critical view of the educational system. Anarchist writers and philosophers, from the XIX century to our days, deal with these topics from different angles and different fields in TM's pages.

The title of the exhibition refers to the text contained in TM#3, *History of the Universe in 20 Minutes* of the Mexican architect, philosopher and writer Braulio Hornedo Rocha who, during a performance in Puebla, Mexico, explained the history of the universe from 13.700 million years ago until today within 20 minutes. His narration of the origin of the universe, of the solar system and of the most important stages in the development of mankind (fire, agriculture, language and urban development) and a quote from Goethe on the importance of knowing the history of the past 3.000 years, introduces his critical thoughts about todays highly regimented education controlled by capitalism. An education that does not lead to a free, universally thinking spirit, but only specialises people to insert them into a division of labor.

Photographs, videos, and various actions and performances that have been generated along the editorial activities, document the process and serve as materials of the exhibition.

Among others, 448 small-size pictures that compose the supplement of Tiempo Muerto #2 will be in show during the exhibition. The pictures illustrate the development of a utopian colony in Mexico, an ideal community founded in the second half of the nineteenth century. The photographs will be displayed on the walls of the Kunstraum München and can be directly purchased by the visitors for an amount equal to the fees charged by the "original owners." In this way an economic mechanism will be set in motion during the three days of the exhibition; the appropriation of the same economical mechanisms that institutions use over cultural patrimony.
